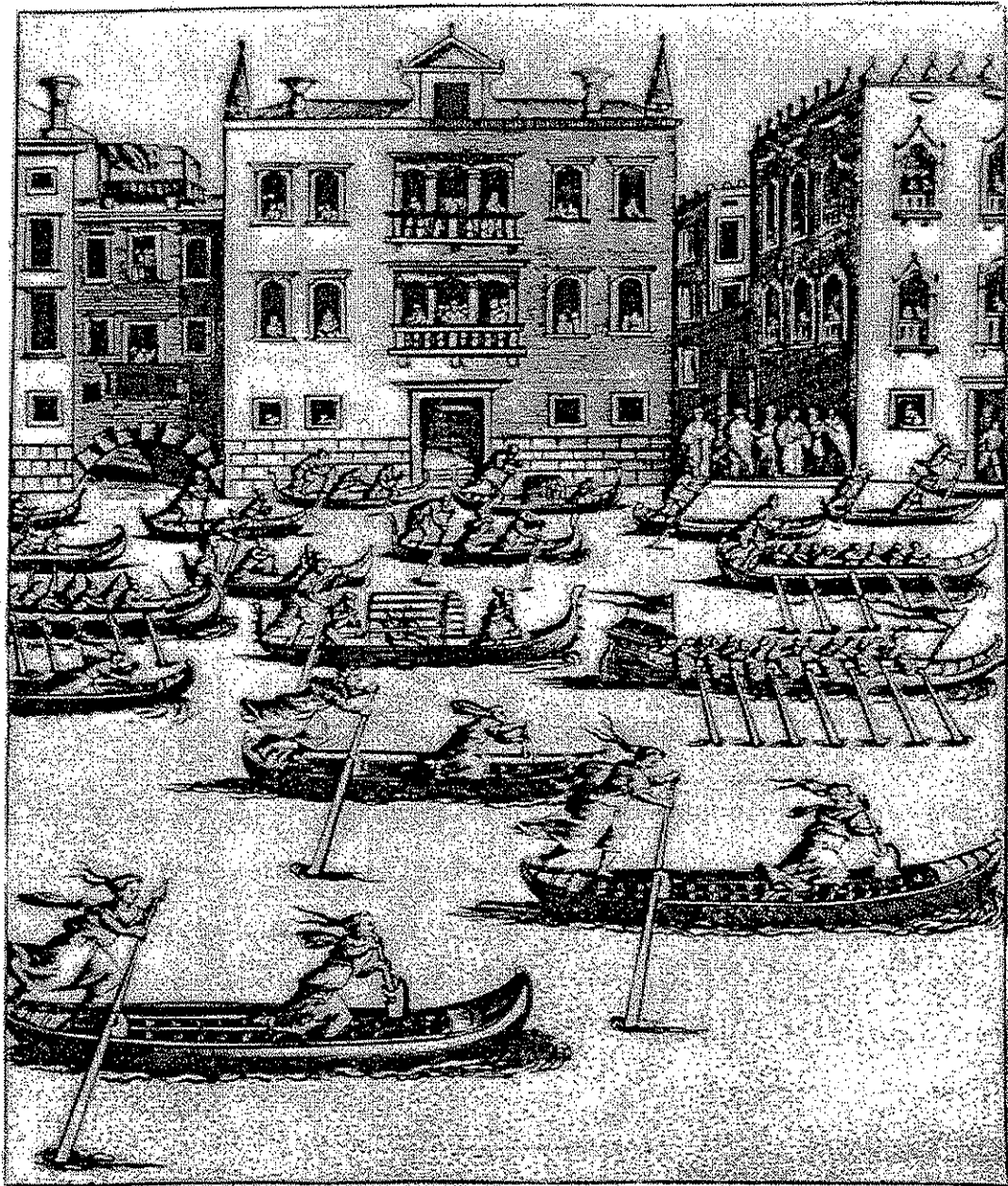

What is the situation and what are the perspectives of sport history as a scientific discipline in different countries? The ISHPES Bulletin wants to collect and publish information and statements relating to this question from all parts of the world. In this issue we publish the contributions submitted by

Victor Andrade de Melo/Lamartine P. DaCosta and by Floris van der Merwe; the first reports on signs of recent advancements in the history of sport in Brazil, the second notes the fast decline of sport history in the last decades in South Africa.

Brief Notes on the History of Sport and Physical Education in Brazil

The history of sport made its appearance in Brazil in the late nineteenth century when magazine articles and books gave historical descriptions of horse-racing and rowing, the most popular sports at that time. Symptomatically, the pioneer authors were journalists and sport amateurs. Since then and up to the 1980s, this non-academic concern with the history of sport prevailed despite a significant and continuing growth of university courses and professionalism in physical education and sports in Brazil after the 1930s. During the 1980s a few academic studies were found in physical education journals aiming at acknowledging Brazilian perspectives. But this new trend did not yet represent a well defined field of investigation.

By the beginning of the 1990s key elements of a scientific mainstream were identified in the history of sport production, such as structured discussion, academic concern, sense of organisation and development.

This profile was mainly encompassed by two initiatives: the Research Group on the History of Sport from the University of Campinas and the National Colloquy on the History of Sport, Leisure and Physical Education.

In addition to these accomplishments, two university post graduate programs at master and doctorate levels started up to support lines of research on the history of sport as well as to offer specific, specialised credits in this discipline.

Furthermore, since 1993 five national congresses have taken place in different locations of Brazil in order to give an opportunity to scholars and students for presenting their studies and research reports in the old but also renewed issue of the history of sport. From the 35 contributions presented in the first national event, there are now an average of 80 works in each congress. The 1998 congress is to be held in Rio de Janeiro with the support of University Gama Filho and the Brazilian Institute of History and Geography, the oldest and one of the most prestigious institutions in the country connected to both disciplines.

In all, these annual meetings of historians have confirmed a major focus on sport as well as a decrease in interest in physical education. A similar preference of participants is for methodological issues as well as an increasing concern with national and regional themes of investigation. Both approaches seem to be evidence of searching for initial and consistent standpoints for the „new“ branch of research.

The search for identity and solid groundwork by Brazilian new adherents of the history of sport can also be seen in

international exchanges. Thus, for the 1996 (Belo Horizonte) and 1997 (Maceio) congresses, James A. Mangan, Eric Dunning, Roland Renson, Mike Featherstone and Birger Petersen were invited, to give additional seminars in the University of Campinas (São Paulo) and the University Gama Filho (Rio de Janeiro).

Currently, there are contacts to bring to the next Rio de Janeiro congress other important European and North American colleagues in another round of comparisons between international and national history of sport trends and characterisations.

In exchange, three papers by Brazilian researchers were included in the Lyon ISHPES Congress (July 1997) besides the inclusion of two Brazilian members in the Editorial Board of IJHS in the same year. With regard to international publishing, a first contribution to IJHS recently appeared focusing on the history of sport in Rio de Janeiro, where in the mid-nineteenth century some European-style sport competitions were important social events.

This exchange on a national and international basis had also a recent and significant drive by means of Internet connections. There is now available a Brazilian network on the history of physical education and sport uniting more than 100 participants from 10 countries. The network had a reception of almost 800 messages during its 17 months of functioning. These results motivated the organisers of the list to develop a home page, providing a permanent and updated meeting point for sport historians.

In summary, the long-term existence of the history of sport in Brazil is finally showing an organic whole often recognised by its scientific production instead of an explicit and formal movement of academic leadership and supporters. Unlike most advanced cases of history of sport development, there is no national association behind the Brazilian outstanding growth of interests on this area of knowledge. Perhaps the networking approach assumed by initial actions for improvement might explain the lack of the usual scientific community linkages.

The clear-sighted advance in Brazilian history of sport, however, is far from a needed search of singular profiles related to sport and physical education as practised in the country. Also important is the small recognition of Brazilian intellectuals with regard to the influence of sports in shaping social facts.

In other words, the history of sport in Brazil - old and

new - has latterly gone international, but it still marginalizes the lived in favour of the textual. In order to redress this unbalanced development, Brazilian historians will need to follow examples of other countries.

The status of sport history in South Africa

Traditionally sport history was one of the core subjects in Physical Education in South Africa. Over the past two decades the subject has been gradually exfoliated by nearly all universities. At present it is mainly the Afrikaans-speaking universities that give some attention to the history of sport. Of these universities it is only Stellenbosch that offers a full semester course in history. This is being done at graduate and undergraduate levels, although at graduate level it is not compulsory.

The textbook on Sport History for South African Students by van der Merwe is only used by three universities at present. They are the University of Stellenbosch, the University of Potchefstroom and the Rand Afrikaans University.

In the 1980s students still showed an interest in doing their Masters' or Doctoral studies in History, but in the 1990's there is a definite decline. The popularity of bioki-

netics can be blamed for this. With the latter there are job opportunities, whilst with history there are practically none. In the past many school teachers read for a Masters' degree as it had higher salary implications for them. This system has been abandoned by the new South Africa with the result that this fountain has also dried up.

In general life, outside the academy, people still laugh when you say you teach sport history. The general attitude is „is that a university subject?“ My usual response is in the form of a counter-question: „How can you study fine art, without any knowledge of the history of it?“

Bericht der Präsidentin

Liebe Kollegen und Kolleginnen,

die erste Jahreshälfte war für mich hier in Berlin sehr hektisch. Wie viele von Euch möglicherweise schon gehört haben, wird derzeit intensiv über die Schließung des Instituts für Sportwissenschaft an der Freien Universität diskutiert. Die einzige Ausbildungsstätte für Sportwissenschaft wird dann an der Humboldt-Universität bestehen. Ob es mir und meinen Kollegen und Kolleginnen gelingt, das Institut oder zumindest einzelne Studiengänge zu retten, ist noch ungewiß. Eines ist auf jeden Fall sicher, wir sind verbeamtet und können nicht entlassen werden. Ich kann mich also selbstverständlich auch weiter um IHPES kümmern.

Derzeit wird intensiv an den nächsten IHPES-Veranstaltungen gearbeitet. Ich bedanke mich bei den Kollegen und Kolleginnen in Bulgarien für ihr Engagement und

ich freue mich schon auf das Treffen in Sunny Beach. Auch die Vorbereitungen für Budapest 1999 sind auf gutem Weg. Wir müssen uns zudem intensiv darüber Gedanken machen, wo die IHPES-Veranstaltungen 2000 und 2001 ausgerichtet werden könnten. Möglich wäre es, eine Kooperation mit dem geplanten vorolympischen Kongreß 2000 in Brisbane vorzunehmen. Ich habe auch Kontakte mit den Kollegen DaCosta in Brasilien und Yamamoto in Japan aufgenommen, damit wir unsere außereuropäischen Initiativen verstärken. Wir werden die Frage der kommenden Veranstaltungen auf jeden Fall in Sunny Beach diskutieren.

Die IHPES-Reihe ist derzeit weiter am Wachsen: Inzwischen sind die Shunde-Proceedings, die Proceedings von Lyon und der Band über den Betriebssport in der Druckerei.

Den Berichtsband über die Tagung in Shunde kann ich sicher nach Sunny Beach mitbringen. Außerdem weise ich auf das Sonderheft des Journal of Comparative Physical Education and Sport hin, das in enger Zusammenarbeit von ISCPES und ISHPES entstanden ist. Nähere Informationen finden sich in diesem Bulletin.

Dear Colleagues:

The first half of the year has been very hectic, at least for me here in Berlin. As some of you already know, the Free University is discussing the possibility of closing the Institute of Sport Science. This would mean that the only place in Berlin to study sport science and physical education would be at Humboldt University in the eastern part of the city. It is uncertain if my colleagues and I can manage to save the Institute, or even the masters courses here. But one thing is for sure: we are employed by the state and that means that we cannot be dismissed. Therefore, it will be no problem for me to continue my work for ISHPES in the near future.

As we prepare for the 1998 Congress, I would like to thank our colleagues in Bulgaria for all their efforts. I look forward to meeting them and you in Sunny Beach. Also, the 1999 Congress in Budapest is well under way. We have to discuss in Bulgaria where future ISHPES meetings will take place and who will organize them. It may be possible to cooperate with the organizers of the pre Olympic Congress in Brisbane, Australia, perhaps for a satellite conference. I have also contacted our Brazilian colleague, Lamartine Da-Costa and our colleague from Japan, Tokuro Yamamoto, as we would like to strengthen our relations outside Europe.

The ISHPES Series is still growing. The Seminar Proceedings from Shunde, the Congress Proceedings from Lyon, and the book about Sport in German firms are in print. Physical Education and Sport which is a special joint venture of ISHPES and ISCPES. More information about this issue is included in the Bulletin. The ISHPES Awards have been very well received. The Award Committee, in agreement with the Executive Committee, has decided to give the 1998 ISHPES Award to Prof. Dr. Alan Metcalfe. He will be a keynote speaker in Sunny Beach and will be honoured there for his scientific work. I would like to congratulate Alan Metcalfe and I am very pleased that such an outstanding ISHPES member has been selected.

I also wish to thank the International Council for Sport, Sport Science and Physical Education. In March there was a meeting of the Executive Committee. These discussions were very creative and fruitful with respect to the future of ICSSPE and the professions and disciplines it represents. Gudrun Doll-Teppler in particular is responsible for these new initiatives in the association and in the scientific community. More information about ICSSPE can be found below in this issue.

Many thanks to all our colleagues who have forwarded information for this Bulletin. However, there are still not enough sport historians who take advantage of this forum!! Your input would be welcomed by the editors and valued by your colleagues world-wide.

I wish you and all my colleagues a wonderful summer, not too much work, and plenty of fun. I look forward to meeting you in Bulgaria.

Rapport de la Présidente

Chers collègues,

Alan Metcalfe - 1998 ISHPES Award Winner

Prof. Dr. Alan Metcalfe has been honoured as the second recipient of the ISHPES Award. He follows in the footsteps of the inaugural winner, Prof. Dr. Roberta Park. As the 1998 winner, Alan has been invited to present one of the keynote addresses at the ISHPES Congress in Sunny Beach, Bulgaria this September. His selection is well deserved.

Alan Metcalfe came originally from Jarrow in the North-east of England, near Newcastle-Upon-Tyne. He earned a Diploma from Loughborough College that led him to a teaching career. In the late 1950's he marched to the west in search of fame and fortune. After arriving in North America, he spent the next decade teaching school and completing a Bachelors Degree in British Columbia, Canada; finishing two Masters degrees and a Doctoral degree in Wisconsin, USA; and lecturing at New York University. In 1969 he accepted a position at the University of Windsor in Canada and remained there until his retirement this August. Windsor recently bestowed the title of Professor-Emeritus upon him.

Alan is a long-time member of ISHPES. He attended the majority of HISPA meetings, beginning with the 1972 unofficial meeting of that organization in Paris. His support

continued when HISPA and ICOSH merged to form ISHPES. Twice he has delivered keynote addresses at HISPA/ISHPES conferences - Gubbio, 1987 and Lillehammer, 1994. He has also presented keynotes at the NASSH and BSSH meetings. His many regular papers have been given all over the world - Asia, Africa, Europe (East and West), Oceania, and North America - to audiences that have included academics from a wide range of disciplines.

While Alan has published widely in peer adjudicated journals, proceedings, atlases, and anthologies, his crowning work, *Canada Learns to Play*, was released in 1987. The publication of his new book on sport in the mining villages of East Northumberland will be hastened with retirement.

So, the young man who travelled to the New World has since aged a little, did not find his fortune, but most certainly achieved fame—at least in the eyes of his peers. And who better to judge! The newly bestowed ISHPES Award adds but one more feather to his cap. Sincere congratulations Alan (and may Sunderland reign supreme!).

ISHPES-Preise: Ausschreibung

ISHPES schreibt zwei Preise für herausragende Leistungen auf dem Gebiet der Sportgeschichtsschreibung aus, den ISHPES-Preis (ISHPES Award) und den Reinhard-Sprenger-Preis für Nachwuchswissenschaftler/innen (ISHPES Junior Award).

Der ISHPES-Preis wird einem/einer Sporthistoriker/in

verliehen, der/die zu dem Thema des nächsten ISHPES-Kongresses in Budapest (Juli 1999) grundlegende Beiträge veröffentlicht hat. Der Preis kann auch in Würdigung eines Lebenswerkes für die sporthistorische Forschung vergeben werden. Der/die Preisträger/in wird mit einer Urkunde und einer Ehrengabe ausgezeichnet und erhält die Einladung, auf

dem Kongreß den Preis entgegenzunehmen und den Eröffnungsvortrag zu halten (ISHPES Award Lecture).

Der/die Preisgewinner/in muß Mitglied der IHPES sein. Vorschläge zur Benennung des Preisträgers/der Preisträgerin können von jedem IHPES-Mitglied gemacht werden. Sie sind dem Präsidenten/der Präsidentin bis zum 31. Dezember 1998 vorzulegen. Dem Vorschlag sind der Lebenslauf und ein möglichst vollständiges Schriftenverzeichnis sowie die wichtigsten einschlägigen Buchpublikationen beizufügen. Die Vorschläge sollten in einer offiziellen IHPES-Sprache vorgelegt werden. Die eingereichten sporthistorischen Veröffentlichungen können in jeder beliebigen Sprache verfaßt sein. Die Benennung des Preisträgers/der Preisträgerin nimmt das vom IHPES-Rat gewählte Preis-Komitee (Award Committee) vor.

Der Reinhard-Sprenger-Preis für Nachwuchswissenschaftler/innen wird ebenfalls im Rahmen des IHPES-Kongresses in Budapest verliehen. Mit dem Preis wird eine unpublizierte Arbeit von besonderer Qualität auf dem Gebiet der

sporthistorischen Forschung ausgezeichnet. Die Teilnahme steht allen Nachwuchswissenschaftler/innen offen, die im Jahre der Tagung das 40. Lebensjahr noch nicht vollendet haben. Das Thema ist unabhängig vom Tagungsthema. Die Preis-Arbeit muß in einer der offiziellen IHPES-Sprachen (deutsch, englisch, französisch) vorgelegt werden; der reine Text (ausschließlich des wissenschaftlichen Apparats) darf 20.000 Zeichen nicht überschreiten. Als vorrangige Kriterien für die Zuerkennung des Preises gelten die Originalität der Problemstellung sowie der Erkenntnisgewinn für die internationale Sportgeschichtsschreibung.

Der Reinhard-Sprenger-Preis für Nachwuchswissenschaftler/innen ist mit DM 1000 dotiert. Der/die Preisträger/in sowie alle weiteren Einsender/innen, deren Arbeiten mit einer lobenden Anerkennung ausgezeichnet werden, erhalten ein Diplom, das bei der Tagung bei der Verkündung der Ergebnisse des Wettbewerbs in feierlichem Rahmen überreicht wird. Die Arbeiten müssen vor dem 30. April 1999 beim IHPES-Sekretariat eingereicht sein.

ISHPES Awards: Invitation for Entries

ISHPES awards two prizes for notable accomplishments in the field of sport history: the IHPES Award and the Reinhard Sprenger Award for work done by young scholars.

The IHPES Award is presented to a sport historian who has published pioneering work on the subject focused upon in the next IHPES congress in Budapest (July 1999). The award can also be presented as a tribute to a scholar with a life-long record of research in sport history. The prize is accompanied by a certificate and an invitation to accept the award and give the opening lecture (the IHPES Award Lecture) at the next congress.

The Award winner must be a member of IHPES. Every IHPES member is eligible to nominate candidates for the award, and nominations must be submitted to the President before December 31, 1998. Nominations must be accompanied by a list - as complete as possible - of the nominees' works as well as their major publications in the field of sport history. While nominations should be submitted in one of the official IHPES languages, the publications accompanying the nominations may be written in any language. The prize-winner will be chosen by an Award Committee elected

by the IHPES Council.

The Reinhard Sprenger Award for young scholars will be presented at the IHPES congress in Budapest for an unpublished study of outstanding quality in the field of sport history research. The participation is open for every scholar who is not over the age of 39 in the year of the opening of the Congress. The subject of the study must not be related to the topic of the IHPES event. The study must be submitted in one of the official IHPES languages (German, English or French) and the text itself (not including notes, appendix, etc.) must not exceed 20,000 characters. The main criteria for selecting the winning study will be the originality of author's approach and the knowledge gained for international sport history.

The Reinhard Sprenger Award is endowed with a prize of 1,000,- German marks. The winner, together with other entrants whose work is given an honourable mention, will receive a diploma which will be presented at an award ceremony during the event. The studies must be submitted to the IHPES secretariat before April 30, 1999.

Prix de l'ISHPES: Invitation aux candidatures

L'ISHPES décerne deux prix pour d'excellents travaux dans le domaine de l'histoire du sport: Le prix de l'ISHPES (ISHPES Award) et le prix Reinhard Sprenger pour jeunes chercheurs.

Le prix de l'ISHPES sera décerné au prochain congrès de l'ISHPES à Budapest (juillet 1999) à un historien du sport qui a publié des ouvrages fondamentaux sur le thème du congrès. Le prix peut également honorer le travail d'ensemble par lequel un chercheur a contribué de façon significative à l'historiographie du sport. Le lauréat obtiendra un diplôme et sera invité au congrès pour recevoir le prix et pour donner la communication inaugurale (ISHPES Award Lecture).

Le lauréat doit être membre de l'ISHPES. Tout membre de l'ISHPES peut proposer des candidats pour le prix. Les propositions doivent être adressées au président/à la présidente avant le 31 décembre 1998. Le curriculum vitae, la liste des publications (la plus complète possible) ainsi que les ouvrages les plus importants de la personne proposée sont à joindre. Les propositions devront être soumises dans l'une des trois langues officielles de l'ISHPES, les publications peuvent être rédigées dans n'importe quelle langue. Le lauréat sera désigné par un comité élu par le Conseil de l'ISHPES.

Le prix Reinhard Sprenger pour jeunes chercheurs sera

Le prix Reinhard Sprenger pour jeunes chercheurs sera également décerné dans le cadre du congrès de l'ISHPES à Budapest. Il récompensera un travail non publié de haute qualité dans le domaine de l'histoire du sport. La participation est libre à tout chercheur qui a moins de 40 ans à l'année du colloque. Le thème est indépendant du thème du colloque. Le travail doit être remis dans l'une des trois langues officielles de l'ISHPES (allemand, anglais, français). Le texte (sans les annotations) ne doit pas excéder 20.000 signes. Comme critères primordiaux pour la désignation du

lauréat, seront considérés l'originalité de la problématique et la portée du contenu pour la progression de l'historiographie du sport internationale.

Le prix Reinhard Sprenger est doté de 1000 DM. Le lauréat ainsi que tous les autres participants dont les travaux auront recueilli une appréciation élogieuse, recevront un diplôme qui leur sera remis dans un cadre solennel lors de la prononciation des résultats du concours pendant le colloque. Les travaux sont à envoyer au secrétariat de l'ISHPES avant le 30 avril 1999.

To date, the Committee has focused on two projects — SPORHIST and the ISHPES WWW Site.

SPORHIST is an electronic mail service run by ISHPES but available to anybody interested in sport history. It was started on February 28, 1995, and now has approximately 350 subscribers from 32 different countries. The service has averaged over 154 messages a month since it was started. The number of postings have been growing as SPORHIST becomes better known. For example, in 1995 an average of 134 messages were posted per month; so far in 1998 an average of 195 messages per month have been distributed. The postings include congress/conference/seminar announcements (e.g. electronic registration, accommodation details, programmes, etc.); information about publications (e.g. calls for manuscripts, indexes to journals, library and archive holdings, etc.); news about expositions and special museum displays; discussions of topics, such as „sport and popular culture,“ „mass media and the Olympics,“ „sport history films and videos,“ etc.; the distribution of sport history related materials from other electronic mailing lists; and, of course, numerous requests for research assistance from sport history scholars - and, responses from other SPORHIST subscribers.

SPORHIST has been abused occasionally over the years as subscribers have sent private messages to the entire list or flamed a posting they objected to. However, most of these have been accidental and they have not detracted from the overall value of this service.

The ISHPES World Wide Web site can be located at the following address:

This site is linked to a number of others including those of the British Society of Sports History, the North American Society for Sport History, and the European Committee for the History of Sport. The ISHPES site is the 2nd oldest web site of its type and contains virtually the entire history of ISHPES. Visitors can view all Congress and Seminar programmes from the Greek Congress at Olympia in 1989 to the 1998 Sunny Beach Congress in Bulgaria. Information on past Seminars and Congresses include the names of presenters and the titles of their papers. Upcoming conferences outline accommodation, registration and programmatic details.

In addition to the above, the site also provides access to the most recent issues of the ISHPES Bulletin; ISHPES Conference Proceedings that have been published or are being prepared for publication; details of the two ISHPES Awards; and the current contents of a number of sport history journals. Viewers will soon be able to visit sport history museums, libraries, archives, and expositions.

At present the ISHPES WWW site is averaging about 300 visits per day.

Committee members are examining ways in which they can make the electronic world more accessible and understandable to sport historians. The Committee is currently discussing possibilities in this regard with respect to the 1999 ISHPES Congress in Budapest, Hungary. Further, we are considering how we can expand the WWW site by involving additional ISHPES members in its development and maintenance.

Dear Colleagues,

During the EXPO 2000 in Hannover, the 3rd World Festival of Traditional Games will take place. It will be supported by ICSSPE and by UNESCO. There are also plans to organise a Scientific Symposium on June 18/19, 2000 in Hannover. ISHPES has been asked to reflect on a possible focus for this symposium. There have already been some conferences dealing with the topic of traditional games with a more general perspective. We should now try to work on one or more topics in-depth.

Do you have any ideas about possible specific issues which are important and which should be addressed?

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Allen Guttmann

He has done two books on the Olympics: a biography of Avery Brundage (1984) and a social history of the modern games (1992). «Games and Empires» (1994) is his more-Veblen-than-Gramsci contribution to the debate over sports and cultural imperialism. His interest in women's sports led to «Women's Sports» (1991) and the editorship (with Karen Christensen and Gertrud Pfister) of the «Encyclopedia of Women in Sport» (forthcoming). Controversy over «Women's Sports» stimulated him to write an even more controversial book on «The Erotic in Sports» (1996), about men as well as women. He has also written a study of sports spectators (1986) and an interpretation of American sports (1988). He is working (with Lee Thompson) on a history of Japanese sports.

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Wray Vamplew

Wray Vamplew is Professor of Sports History and Director of the International Centre for Sports History at De Montfort University, Leicester. His previous appointment was as Pro-Vice-Chancellor at the Flinders University of South Australia.

As well as being a member of the ISHPES Council, he is currently President of the European Committee for Sport History and a member of the Executive of the British Society of Sports History. He serves on the editorial boards of the Journal of Olympic History, the Sport History Review and the Sports Historian. He is a past President of the Australian Society for Sports History and was foundation editor of its journal „Sporting Tradition“.

His work has focused on the commercialisation of and professionalism in sport and his Pay up and Play the Game won the North American Society of Sport History's book prize in 1988. He also received the Australian Sport Commission's Sport Science Education Award for his report on violence in Australian sport. His most recent books have had an Australian flavour: the Oxford Companion to Australian Sport (co-editor), Sport in Australian Society (joint editor) and Sport in Australian History (joint author). However, he has now returned to British sports history and is writing the history of the Physical Education Association of the United Kingdom (with Steve Bailey) and the Centennial History of the Professional Golfers Association (with Richard Holt and Peter Lewis) and editing the Encyclopedia of British Sport (with Grant Jarvie and Richard Cox).

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Floris van der Merwe

Floris van der Merwe was born on the 5th of January 1951 in the Strand, a beach resort 50km outside Cape Town, South Africa. He later studied at the University of Stellenbosch where he obtained the BA degree in Physical Education and History, the Senior Secondary Teachers' Diploma, a Honours degree in Physical Education and a Masters' degree in History. He also studied at the Potchefstroom University where he did his Masters' and Doctoral studies in Sport History, the theme of which was South Africa's participation in the British Empire Games and the Olympic Games.

He was appointed lecturer at the University of Stellenbosch in January 1979, where he at present occupies the position of senior lecturer in the Department of Human Movement Science. He teaches Sport History and Research Methods. Since 1977, Floris has published 33 articles in scientific journals, 28 articles in other journals and magazines, 36 books and chapters in books/proceedings, and has presented papers at congresses on 34 occasions.

He was a member of HISPA and is now of course a member of ISHPES. He is also a member of the South African Association for Sport Science, the British Society of Sports History, the North American Society for Sport History, the Australian Society for Sport History and the Association of Sports Historians.

Since 1981 (Lisbon), Floris has been a regular participant at HISPA and later ISHPES meetings and is now serving his second term on the council. He also organised the 1995 congress which took place in Cape Town.

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Wang Zhi

Mr. Wang Zhi was born in NanJing, JiangSu province, China, in 1943. In July 1966, he graduated from the University of Science and Technology for National Defence. He has ever been a secretary, an editor and a teacher. Between 1981 and 1983, he studied Philosophy at the National Defence University, and then he stayed there to be a teacher and manager. In August 1993, he came to the China Sports Museum. Now he is vice-president of this museum, and vice-director, and general secretary of the Chinese Society of History of Sports and Physical Education. He is also chief editor of «Sports History».

His main contributions in sport history: «5000 Years of Physical Culture and Sports in China» (chief editor); «15 Years of Reform for Chinese Physical Education and Sports» (chief editor); «The History of Track and Field in China»; (chief editor); «The History of Chess in China» (chief editor); «The History of Model Airplane in China».

1998 NASSH Convention Ontario (Canada), May 22-25, 1998

The North American Society for Sport History held its Twenty-Sixth Annual Convention at the University of Windsor in Ontario, Canada, from May 22-25, 1998. The NASSH Council and the Society's various Committees met on Friday. The academic portion of the program ran from early morning until late afternoon on Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The social program included a Wine and Cheese Reception on Friday evening sponsored by the University of Windsor's President, a cruise of the Detroit River and Lake St Clair on Sunday evening sponsored by Human Kinetics Press, and Monday's closing Banquet sponsored by the College of Arts and Human Sciences at the University of Windsor. Don Morrow (President-Elect of NASSH) was the Chair of the Program Committee; Alan Metcalfe, Vicky Paraschak and Michael Salter (University of Windsor) were the Convention Managers.

157 delegates registered for the convention. Of these, 16 were doctoral students studying in North America; 18 came from Australia, Denmark, France, Germany, Great Britain, Hong Kong, New Zealand, Norway, South Africa, and Sweden. About 20 delegates were accompanied to Windsor by their spouse or a companion.

Ron Smith (Secretary-Treasurer of NASSH) once again organized the Convention's outstanding Book and Journal Display. Ron also screened the new film, „Sport in the People's Century, 1900-1999“, produced by WGBH in Boston and the BBC for the Public Television System.

More than 70 papers were presented over the course of the three day academic program. Because of the volume of presentations three sessions ran simultaneously. A total of 29 sessions were scheduled, about a third of which involved a commentator or reactor. All sessions were arranged the-

matically and covered among other things: Canadian sport, US Intercollegiate athletics, historiography, nationalism, cultural issues, PE and sport in Europe, religion, the Olympics, commercialism, ancient sport, fringe leisure, and such specific sports as ice hockey, body building, aquatics, football, baseball, and so on. Three sessions included panelists and took on the nature of Round Table discussions. One dealt with race, another with Jewish sport, and the third critiqued Steve Pope's new book „Patriotic Games: Sporting Traditions in the American Imagination, 1876-1926,“ (NY: Oxford University Press, 1997).

Two superb Keynote addresses were delivered. The first, which covered the history and future of television contracts with the IOC, was given by Richard Pound (Vice-President of the International Olympic Committee). The second was presented by Charles Korr (University of Missouri- St. Louis) who dealt with leisure and sport in South Africa's recent penal community on Robben Island. The Graduate Student Essay winner was Susan Forbes (University of Western Ontario). Her paper, „Defining Practices: Female Employees' Leisure at Eaton's“, was given in a special session.

Roberta Park (retired - University of California, Berkeley) and Alan Metcalfe (retired - University of Windsor) were presented with NASSH Recognition Awards at the closing banquet.

NASSH will be hosted next year by Penn State University, University Park, Pennsylvania, May 28-31, 1999.

Tagungen des Niedersächsischen Instituts für Sportgeschichte (NISH) Hoya (Deutschland), 1996 und 1997

1996 und 1997 führte das NISH die 4. und 5. niedersächsische Tagung zur Sportgeschichte durch, wobei thematisch die Entwicklung von Turnen, Spiel und Sport in der Zeit der Weimarer Republik und in der Zeit des Nationalsozialismus behandelt wurde. Die Teilnehmer waren sowohl professionelle Sporthistoriker als auch Archivare sowie interessierte Laien aus Vereinen und Verbänden, worin das NISH eine Bestätigung seiner Bemühungen sieht, immer wieder auch Personen außerhalb von Fachkreisen an die regionale Sportgeschichte heranzuführen.

Inhaltlich standen weder die Geschichte traditioneller

Sportarten noch die Vereinsentwicklung im Vordergrund, sondern Themen, die geeignet waren, das Bild der Geschichte und die Rolle des Sports in ihr für den jeweiligen Untersuchungszeitraum zu verdeutlichen.

Bei der 4. Tagung vom 22. bis 23. Februar 1996 gab ein umfassendes Einführungsreferat einen Einblick in die Entwicklung des Sports auf lokaler Ebene vor dem Hintergrund politischer und lokaler Tendenzen. Referiert wurde über die Kommunalisierung des Sports, die Sportberichterstattung, die Geschichte des Betriebssports sowie des Wassersports. Die Musterturnschule in Lüneburg wurde ebenso vorgestellt

wie Aspekte des Wehrsports oder der Freikörperkultur in Niedersachsen. Ein Vortrag zum Handballspiel in den Kreisen Minden und Lübbecke gab nicht nur einen Einblick in die Entwicklung einer Handballhochburg im benachbarten Nordrhein-Westfalen, sondern bot gleichzeitig die Möglichkeit eines interessanten Vergleichs mit den Verhältnissen in Niedersachsen.

Während der 5. Tagung vom 21. bis 23. Februar 1997 vermittelte das Einführungsreferat zunächst einen Überblick über den Stand der sporthistorischen Forschung für die Jahre 1933 bis 1945. Aufgrund zahlreicher Publikationen in den letzten 30 Jahren gilt die NS-Zeit mittlerweile als eine gut erforschte Periode deutscher Sportgeschichte, wobei regionale und lokale Untersuchungen, wie sie das NISH betreibt und forciert, dazu beitragen, das Bild der Geschichte abzurufen und zu verdichten.

Großes Interesse fanden Beiträge, die die politische Einflußnahme des NS-Staates auf den Sport herausstellten. So beschäftigte sich ein Vortrag mit dem wenig bekannten „Dietwesen“, das alle Organisationsebenen des Sports als politisches Schulungselement durchzog. Die Dietarbeit hatte den Zweck, den Reichsbund für Leibesübungen, dem alle Sportorganisationen angegliedert waren, an den Staat zu binden und in den Vereinen und bei ihren Mitgliedern das Bewußtsein zu verankern, daß die Leibesübungen nicht Selbstzweck seien, sondern der Erweckung und Erhaltung des Wehrwillens, des Volksstolzes und des Volksgefühls zu

dienen hatte. Ferner sollte das innere Leben der Vereine aufgrund der kulturellen, geistigen und rassenpolitischen Erkenntnisse des Nationalsozialismus neu gestaltet werden. Daß die Realität der Dietarbeit indes hinter der formulierten Programmatik zurückblieb, wurde anhand mehrerer Beispiele verdeutlicht.

Eine wichtige Rolle spielte bei der Verbreitung der nationalsozialistischen Ideologie die Hitler-Jugend. Innerhalb der HJ wurden die Leibesübungen als ein geeignetes Erziehungsmittel eingesetzt, um Kinder und Jugendliche körperlich auf die zukünftigen Aufgaben vorzubereiten. Der von seinen persönlichen Erfahrungen geprägte Bericht eines Zeitzeugen über den sportlichen Alltag in der HJ rundete das Bild ab. Ein weiteres Referat beschäftigte sich mit der protestantischen Turnbewegung; ferner wurden Feldpostbriefe als sporthistorische Quelle vorgestellt. Ein Referat zur Geschichte des Berufsringkampfes gab Einblicke in die Entwicklung von Kraftsport und Boxen in Niedersachsen. Regionale und lokale Akzente setzten Beiträge zur Geschichte des Handballspiels im Landkreis Verden, über die Nienburger Sportberichterstattung in der Zeit von 1933 - 1939 sowie über die Entwicklung bürgerlicher Turn- und Sportvereine in der Stadt Hannover. Abgesehen von lokalen Entwicklungen und Besonderheiten war festzustellen, daß die politische Einflußnahme den Sport in allen Regionen gleichermaßen erfaßte und sowohl in städtischen wie auch ländlichen Gebieten ihre Umsetzung fand.

Sport et démocratie Paris 1998

Du 3 juin au 30 juillet 1998 se déroule une exposition sur „sport et démocratie“ dans la Galerie des Fêtes du Palais Bourbon, à l'Assemblée Nationale. La conjonction du lieu et du thème peut surprendre. L'initiative provient en réalité de Laurent Fabius, Président de l'Assemblée Nationale, qui a souhaité ouvrir les portes du magnifique Palais Bourbon, l'un des tout premiers symboles de la République, au grand public à l'occasion de deux expositions annuelles. La première s'est déroulée en mars 1998 sur le thème du cent cinquantième de la Révolution de 1848. Coupe du monde en France oblige, la seconde traite donc des rapports entre sport et démocratie. Cette même conjonction du thème et du lieu a imposé évidemment certains choix. Ne pas encenser le sport, mais rester objectif et mettre en évidence les paradoxes et les contradictions des rapports entre le sport et la démocratie. Construire une exposition pour le grand public, mais aussi à destination des quelques 550 parlementaires présents à l'Assemblée pour représenter le pays. La tâche du commis-

saire général de l'exposition, Jean Durry, par ailleurs directeur du musée national des sports, n'a donc pas été simple. Pour ce faire, il s'est entouré d'un groupe de spécialistes parmi lesquels on compte Pierre Arnaud, Jean-Paul Callède, Alain Ehrenberg, Jacques Defrance, Christian Pociello, Marcel Spivak, Thierry Terret ou Georges Vigarello.

L'exposition est finalement organisée sur une logique thématique qui recouvre trois dimensions complémentaires: „le sport, espace de démocraties...“, „le sport, une conquête populaire“, „le sport, affaire de la nation“. On y trouve des pièces aussi originales que des fresques grecques, les télégrammes expédiés lors du premier Tour de France cycliste en 1903 par les journalistes de l'Auto, ou encore des superbes affiches et documents des sociétés de gymnastique de la fin du 19ème siècle. Un catalogue de plus de 200 pages permet de reprendre l'essentiel de ces documents avec des textes plus développés rédigés par les différents membres du comité scientifique.

International Council of Sport Science and Physical Education (ICSSPE) The Lausanne Meetings*

Who are and where are we going? These two very concrete and fundamental questions were the basis of the discussions held by the Executive Board, President's Committee and, to some extent the Editorial Board in Lausanne from March 18-22, 1998. Board members travelled to Switzerland to address ICSSPE business matters and, primarily, to reflect on the current structures and functions of the Council. All of the comments that were forwarded from the membership, in response to the questions in Bulletin Nr. 23 (ICSSPE 2000 - Have a Say) were included in the preparation of a two day strategic planning session. The Secretariat invited professional consultants to guide Board members in this strategic planning process.

With the help of a highly effective computerised system, a talented graphic artist and an energetic group of consultants, 25 ICSSPE Executive Board members deliberated the strengths and weaknesses of ICSSPE and paid particular attention to determining what makes ICSSPE a unique organisation with an important and central place in the world of sport science and physical education.

The strategic planning sessions began on March 20, 1998 with brainstorming about ICSSPE's activities, functions, strengths. The ideas submitted anonymously by participants

were discussed openly and were condensed into key competencies and values. On the following day, prioritising and voting began. The presence of guests during the two day session (from partner organisations) was certainly helpful, however, when the voting began, only those responses from members of the Board were recorded.

All members of the Executive Board have received the full set of documents from this Strategic Planning Session - including those who were unable to come to Lausanne. They will be forwarding their final thoughts to Secretariat and the President's Committee will be co-ordinating responses and action plans. The intention of the Executive Board and President's Committee is to prepare proposals for approval of the General Assembly to be held in November, 1998.

This is an extremely exciting time for ICSSPE. Re-evaluation and assessment of structures, strategies and competencies must take place in every forward-moving organisation. The ICSSPE Officers are confident that this process will enable ICSSPE to prepare itself in the most effective way possible to enter the new millennium.

Finnish Society for Sports History Prizes of the Paavo Nurmi writing contest awarded

The prizes of the writing contest „Meetings with Paavo Nurmi“, organised by the Finnish Society for Sports History, were awarded at the Sports Museum of Finland on the 12th of June, 1998. The winner of the first prize (open Finnair flight ticket from Helsinki to New York) was an entry entitled «Paavo Nurmen kanssa kilpailumatkoilla» (On Racing Travels With Paavo Nurmi). Written by Matti Heinonen, it is based on personal reminiscences of the champion runner Kaarlo Tuominen. The jury of the contest considered the text an original and realistic portrayal of Nurmi's person and legends woven about him. The first prize was supplemented by an additional award of 10000 Fmk.

The second prize (5000 Fmk) was awarded to William John Morris for his entry «Meeting Paavo Nurmi. An account of a journey that took forty-five years to accomplish». Conveying a sense of a genuine dialogue with the reputation of Paavo Nurmi, Morris has grasped the subject with both insight and detachment.

The third prize (3000 Fmk) was awarded to Sisko Pel-

tonen for her entry entitled «Paavo Nurmen sylissä» (In The Arms Of Paavo Nurmi). The text conveys the mood of a tender and personally important meeting with the heroic runner.

The jury of the writing contest also decided to award honorary commendations to some entrants for their personal and significant „meetings“ with the legend of Paavo Nurmi or things or objects related to him. The entries thus awarded were: «Neljä kohtaamista Paavo Nurmen kanssa» (Four Meetings with Paavo Nurmi) by Kalle Virtapohja, «Hän ei suostunut vaihtamaan köyhää Suomea vieraan tarjoamaan kultaan - Paavoo Nurmi turkulaisten silmin» (He would not exchange his poor Finland for foreign gold - Paavo Nurmi in the eyes of his fellow townsmen of Turku) by Kimmo Ikonen, «Paavo Nurmi und meine Freiwilligenmeldung» by Klaus Huhn, «Huomionosoltidksia maassa ja taivaalla» (Honours on land and in the skies) by Vesa-Matti Peltola, «Cometh the Hour, Cometh the Man. Paavo Nurmi and the Making of a Sports Hero» by Peter F. Radford, and «Med

Paavo Nurmi i tankarna (With Paavo Nurmi in Thoughts) by Bengt-Herman Nilsson.

The three prize-winning entries will be published in the 1998 Annual of the Finnish Society for Sports History. Other entries and material of the writing contest will be preserved in the Sports Archives of Finland.

The Finnish Society for Sports History wishes to express its thanks to ISHPES for its patronage of the contest, to the foreign members of the jury (Horst Ueberhorst and Bruce Kidd) for their expert contributions and to all entrants for their participation.

Prof. Max Howell's Honorary Doctorate Degree

Emeritus Professor Max Howell, Foundation Chair of Human Movement Studies at the University of Queensland, will receive an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree on June 2 from the University of Alberta, Canada. Dr. Howell is being honoured for his contribution to sport and physical education in Canada, including starting the first Master's and Doctor's degree in his field in the Commonwealth.

Dr. Howell, a former Wallaby and coach of the Canadian national rugby team, has two earned doctorate degrees, one from the University of California at Berkeley and the other from the University of Stellenbosch, South Africa. He was the first Australian in his field to receive a doctorate degree, and has numerous fellowships. He has published 53 books and over 300 research articles.

Dr. Howell was President of the Canadian Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, President of the Canadian Association of Sport Sciences and President of the North American Society for Sport History. Two addresses are named in his honour and that of his late wife: The International Address of the North American Society for Sport History and the Address for the Advancement of Sport History of the Australian Society for Sport History.

At the end of the 19th century growing anti-Semitism and the rise of the Zionist movement led to the founding of separate Jewish clubs in the field of gymnastics and sports. In the decades that followed, Jewish gymnastics and sports organisations sprang up in many countries. However, these organisations pursued differing aims and were rooted in very different ways in Jewish culture and society. Nevertheless, at the centre of a debate dominated by the issues of anti-Semitism, Zionism, assimilation, and acculturation was above all the question of one's individual position - both in sport and in society.

The occasion for holding discussions on the international history of Jewish sport within the framework of a scientific symposium is provided by the 100th anniversary of Bar Kochba Berlin, the first Jewish gymnastics club to be founded in Germany. Although Jewish gymnastics clubs had been founded in previous years - in Constantinople in 1895 and Philippopol/Plovdiv in 1897 - the founding of Bar Kochba Berlin marked a turning-point in Jewish sports culture since it contributed a major impetus to the creation of an international Jewish sports movement. Well into the 1930s members of Bar Kochba Berlin were among the leading representatives of the Jewish gymnastics movement and the Maccabi World Union which grew out of it in 1921.

The aim of the symposium is to highlight the different currents in Jewish sport against the backdrop of not only cultural and political but also regional and national differences: what united the Jewish sports movements and what divided

them; and what they regarded as their particular role both in sport and within the Jewish community? Although the symposium will focus on Jewish sport in Europe, especially in the countries of eastern Europe, attention will also be devoted to other topics such as the significance of Jewish sport in the Diaspora for sports culture in Israel.

Main themes

The following topics will be addressed:

- Development, destruction and reorganisation: Jewish sports culture in Europe, especially in the countries of eastern Europe;
- Jewish sport and its significance in the relations between the Jewish community and the larger society around it;
- Between Zionism and assimilation: Jewish sportsmen and women and Jewish sports movements in Germany;
- Anti-Semitism in gymnastics and sport;
- Expulsion and resistance: Jewish sport and Jewish sportsmen and women under the National Socialists;
- Jewish women in sport;
- The experience of Jewish sportsmen and women after emigrating;
- From Jewish gymnastics to Israeli sport - the origins and development of sport in Israel;
- Proletarian and international: Jewish working-class sport.

Conference languages: German and English. Simultaneous translation will be provided.

Publication of the contributions to the Congress „Traditional Sports as An Integrated Part of Sports for All“.
Journal of Comparative Physical Education and Sport, Number 2, 1997

The 2nd World Festival of Traditional Sports and Games (in Bangkok from 10th to 14th December 1996) was organized on behalf of TAFISA (Trim and Fitness International Sport for All Association) by the Thai Sports Authority under the patronage of the Director General of UNESCO, Hon. Frederico Major. In connection with this Festival a Scientific Congress was staged which consisted of different sections and was the outcome of cooperation between ISHPES (International Society for the History of Physical Education and Sport), TAFISA, ICSSPE (International Council for Sport, Sport Science and Physical Education) and ASFAA (Asiania Sports for All Association). The local organizers were the Thai Sports Authority and Kasetsart University. ISHPES selected the keynote speakers and the papers dealing with traditional games while TAFISA and ASFAA were responsible for the contributions on „Sport for All“.

250 participants from 30 countries attended this Scientific Encounter. The speakers, researchers as well as directors of national programmes presented information and ideas, views and perspectives from 12 different countries.

Four of the main speakers selected by ISHPES gave an overview of definitions, scientific approaches, theories, meanings and problems of traditional games in different cultures and regions. In addition, the role of traditional games in the modern world played an important part in the presentations. Papers which combined a sport historical perspective with a theoretical approach have been specially selected for this issue.

During the conference discussions on traditional sports

and games were held and a questionnaire was distributed in order to obtain information about opportunities for and problems of traditional sports in different countries and regions.

One of the main demands of the participants was the need to spread information about important issues, about tendencies and practices, problems and strategies. This volume of JCPES gives an overview of important topics in the scientific discourse on traditional sports and hopes to encourage the scientific community not only to take part in the reflections and discussions but also help to preserve traditional physical activities.
